1. 1950 Conference of the 60th District

The 1950 Conference for the 60th District will be held in Kyoto in April 15-16-17. Have you already appointed the "On-to-Vyoto Committee"? According to the Conference Committee of the host club only answers to their inquiry are in from 9 clubs, about 130 expecting to attend. The number will doubtless increase as time draws nearer but I solicit your further cooperation in answering the committee's inquiry from time to time.

There is another thing that I would like to have your cooperation; that is in connection with the Roster of the Rotarians in the oOth District, of which there has been a big demand. In order that such roster can be ready for distribution at the Conference, the service of the Conference Committee is available for the compilation of the same. 2. The 45th Anniversary of Rotary

The 45th Anniversary of Rotary is on February 23 (Thursday), as I mentioned in my previous letter. Each Club is urged to arrange a commemorating program, to let the public recognize the existence of the Rotery in its community and acknowledge the reason why, in its regular or special meeting during the week (February 22-25), making the best use of the materials, already in your hands,

3. Fnd-of-1949 Figures on Rotary

110 provisional Rotary clubs became Rotary clubs in the period 1 July, 1949 to 31 December, 1949. Of there 110 clubs, 24 were reestablished clubs. These new clubs were located as follows:

Needless to say the above figures include 11 clubs (=10%) of our country, Yokohama, etc.

Taking the termination of 6 clubs in the same period into consideration, the total number of Rotary clubs as of 31 December was 6,938. Total membership was approximately 335,000.

4. The new club in District 60

One club was re-admitted and two "new" Clubs were born in District 60, since the last report. These make the number of clubs to 23 with the total membership of 961. It is really encouraging. More extension is desired for 1950 with the cooperation of you all. The new clubs are:

There has been changes in meeting places and offices. In compliance with requests from some Rotary clubs I have made a list of Rotary Club in District 50, which is attached to this letter. If you find any errors or omissions or if there are any changes in the future, please let me know without delay, so as to keep my information up-to-date.

An organization meeting was held on 17 January by the provisional Rotary Club of Sendai. They meet on Tuesdays at Brother-ken. A gala meeting was held on 20 January at Figata for the Charter presentation of the Rotary Club there.

5. Fotary Foundation Contributions and Fellows

The Rotary Club of Osaka has since made a contribution to the Rotary Foundation of U.S. \$610. at \$10 each for 81 members, or ¥291,600. We now have 4-100% Clubs in District 60 in Rotary Clubs of Okayama, Tokyo, Hiroshima and Osaka. The Secretariat takes up this matter as a top new in their letter to F.I. officials of the world. Besides the above I received a contribution of ¥118,800 or U.S. \$330. from 33 members of the Rotary club of Fukuoka, making a total receipt up to date of U.S. \$3170 or ¥1,248,600. Thanks a million for your cooperation. I fully expect the same kind of cooperation from other clubs in the district, in the near future.

As of 31 December, 1949, the total contributions to the Rotary Foundation since inception amounted to \$2,402,320. From 1 July, 1949, to 31 December, 1949, contributions amounted to \$69,277.

6. Semi-Annual Report of Wembership and Per Capita Max

Some has sent me the above report but I have not yet received from the others. The report is to be sent to the Secretariat as of 1 January, sending me a copy without fail. It is also desired that the per capita tax should be

7. A young Rotery ambassador

Recently, an unaddressed letter from the U.S. with just the street number was delivered at Rotarian (Past President of R.C. of Tokyo) Kiyota Kaneko's, with P.O.'s actation on the letter, "try the Kaneko's". The letter reads as follows:

"It was my happy and delightful privilege to take your son Hiroshi Kaneko to our Rotary Club today. He was our guest speaker. It is needless to say he did a fine job. Both of you have every reason to be proud of your son. Your son also talked to our International Relations Club which I sponsor and he did a most excellent job. All Rotarians appreciated the talk of your son and I am sure we will read of his success in the future".

It was evident that the letter was meant for the parents of Firoshi Yanako, who is studying at the Central Missouri State College, under personal care of Prof. R.T. Wood, the author of the letter.

Let us hope that all sons and daughters of Rotarians, who are under similar situation as this young Kaneko, would serve as young Rotary ambassadors, wherever possible.

8. Japanese translation of the "Frief Facts About Rotary"

The "Rotary Taiyo", the Japanese translation of the familiar R.I. Tamphlet To. 1, "Prief Facts About Rotary" is now in the press and will be sent to
you when ready. Additional copies are available for your requirements.
Flease make good use of the publication.

9. Reinstatement of the Membership

In working on translation of the "Membership and Classifications in the Rotary Club" (R.I. Pamonlet No. 17) I came across with the following statements on Fage 19 in connection with the reinstatement of the membership, refreshing my memories:--

When the membership of an active member has terminated by reason of his changing from one concern to another or from one line of business to another, he may make new application for membership in the same club, and, whether made under the same or another classification, his application shall be considered in advance of any other, and, if elected to membership, he shall not be required to pay a second admission fee.

"Yo provision is made in the standard constitution for a Fotary club and by-laws recommended for a Rotary club for reinstating a member who has resigned because of illness or has been dropped for not attending the number of consecutive meetings nor the percentage of meetings in a given period of time provided for in the constitution of the club. There is nothing, however, in the standard consitution or by-laws recommended for a Rotary club which would prevent the club form taking back into its membership, as a new member, one whose membership has terminated in such a manner."

The above, particularly the latter paragraph, may, I think, serve as reference to alleviate the worries of some of the clubs.

"Service Is My Business"

The first two printings of 25,000 copies each were exhausted and a third printing, also of 25,000 copies were off the press in December. The book has been in heavy demand during the past several months. Some took a book home to clarify the true meaning of vocational service in Rotary. Some found this a suitable Christmas gift. Some clubs used it as presents to their members on their birthdays. Also the book is found to be a wonderfully fine medium for imparting information to the new member about Rotary's second object. Besides "the constantly increasing number of orders received from non-Rotarians and from non-Rotary organizations testifies to the wide appeal of 'Service Is My Pusiness' in the field of literature dealing in human relations in business and industry", according to the Secretariat Letter.

When we look at the social conditions of Japan today it will not be myself alone who feels the advisability of the translation "Hoshi-koso Waga Tsutome", being more widely read. There still are a number of copies left of the first printing. I solicit your cooperation in the distribution of the work.

11. Re the induction of new members

The skit "the Waking of a Rotarian", illustrating how preinduction information may be given in a simple, but interesting way, of which I have mentioned in my letter wo. 5 dated 16 Fovember, 1949, has been in a great demand from various clubs. I have, therefore, had copies made of the above and attaching to this letter, addressed to the presidents. I earnestly hope that you would make use of the above at a suitable occasion.

12. Club Bulletins

I have often reiterated that every club should issue bulletins weekly, or biveekly, or even monthly and I also strongly urged at the intercity assembly of the Shikoku Island Clubs the other day. The result is evident in having a monthly bulletin of the R.C. of Mochi, of which I am very much pleased.

The most effective way to get out the bulletin is to appoint the bulletin committee and to relyon its activities. Don't say tommorrow but do it today!

Ten Ways to Kill a Good Club

According to the recent Monthly Letter of Vernon Burkhart, Governor of District Mo. 231, R.I., of Barnesville, Ohio "Ten Ways to Kill a Good Club" ere as follows:

- 1. Don't come to meetings.
- If you do, come late.
- 3. If the weather doesn't suit you, don't think of coming.
- 4. If you do attend a moeting, find fault with the officers and members.
- 5. Wevertheless, get annoved if you are not received than to think. *evertheless, get annoyed if you are not appointed to a committee.
- If you are appointed, don't attend the committee meeting.
- 7. If asked by the chairman to give your opinion regarding some important matter, tell him you have nothing to say! After the meeting tell everyone how things should have been done.

- 8. Do nothing more than absolutely necessary. When other members roll up their sleeves and unselfishly use their ability to help things along, how that the club is run by a "clique".
- 9. Hold back your dues as long as possible -- better still, don't pay them at all.
- 10. Don't bother about getting any new members; but if you do, be sure they are grouches like yourself.

Do you know of any one like this? I wish we could say with emphasis that there is no such member in Botary in Japan.
